***Ecumenism through Manuscript Preservation* 204 B**
Matthew Heintzelman, Curator of the Austria/Germany
Study Center & Rare Book Cataloger, and Wayne
Torborg, Director for Digital Collections and Imaging,

University, Collegeville, MN

Since 1965, the Hill Museum & Manuscript Library (HMML) has photographed over 100,000 manuscripts from hundreds of libraries in Europe, Africa, the Middle East, and India.

Preserving manuscript culture has required collaboration with Christians from several traditions, thus making HMML both a “library of libraries” and a locus of ecumenical cooperation. Against the backdrop of the library’s earlier work in microfilm, the presenter will offer an overview of recent digital work in Lebanon, Syria, Turkey, and India. Along with themes of ecumenism, the presentation will raise issues of gathering, organizing, cataloging, and providing access to the library’s diverse collections.
