Personal Name Access Points

On September 16, 2016, Fr. **Gabriele Amorth** SSP died in Rome at the age of 91. Born in Modena, Italy, on May 1, 1925, the future Fr. Amorth fought in the Italian Resistance during World War II and was involved with Catholic Action, the youth movement of the Christian Democratic Party, after the war. He joined the Society of St Paul in 1947 and was ordained a priest in 1951. After working for many years as a journalist for various Italian Catholic media outlets, Fr. Amorth was appointed as exorcist for the Diocese of Rome in 1985. Over the next thirty years, he conducted tens of thousands of exorcisms in this role. Fr. Amorth raised the profile of the office of exorcist within the Church, co-founding the International Association of Exorcists in 1990, writing several best-selling books on the subject of exorcism and his experiences as an exorcist, and frequently commenting on the subject in the press. Philippine politician and stateswoman **Miriam Defensor Santiago** passed away on September 29, 2016. Born as Miriam Palma Defensor in Iloilo City on June 15, 1945, Ms. Santiago studied political science and law in the Philippines and the United States, earning a research doctorate in law from the University of Michigan as well as a masters degree in religious studies from the Maryhill School of Theology. Over the course of her career, she served in various branches of the Philippine government, holding positions as judge, cabinet officer, and senator. An indefatigable fighter against corruption in government and a prolific proposer and sponsor of new legislation, Ms. Santiago enjoyed a high reputation for political rectitude and service in her homeland and abroad, and was known as the “Iron Lady of Asia”. Ms. Santiago was a Catholic who attended Mass daily, though some of the legislation that she promoted drew criticism from the Catholic

Bishops' Conference of the Philippines. The correct access point for works by and about Ms. Defensor Santiago is:

Born in Shelton, Connecticut on July 19, 1912, Peter Leo Gerety studied in seminaries in the United States and France, and was ordained to the priesthood on June 29, 1939. Serving as curate and pastor at several churches in the Diocese of Hartford, Fr. Gerety came to be involved in ministry to the African American Catholic community in New Haven and became a leading Catholic voice for African American civil rights and for anti-poverty programs in the 1960s. In 1966 he was named co-adjutor bishop of the Diocese of Portland and, three years later, was elevated to the bishopric of that diocese. In 1974, he became the Archbishop of Newark. During his tenure in this ecclesiastical office, he established an Office of Pastoral Renewal and initiated a ministry to divorced Catholics in his archdiocese; throughout this period, he supported the charismatic and ecumenical movements and publicly affirmed the culture of life. Resigning from the Archbishopric of Newark in 1986, Bishop Gerety continued to officiate at Baptisms, Confirmations, and other sacramental celebrations in the Archdiocese. At the time of his death on September 20, 2016 at the age of 104 years, he was the oldest living Catholic bishop in the world. The correct access point for works by and about Bishop Gerety is:

In late July, 2016, the German Catholic press reported that the Archdiocese of Munich and Freising is preparing to open the cause for the beatification of the theologian and philosopher Fr. **Romano Guardini**. Born on February 17, 1885, in Verona, Italy, Fr. Guardini spent most of his life in Germany, where he taught at the Universities of Berlin, Tübingen, and Munich. A philosopher who fruitfully explored traditional theological themes in the light of the problems of the contemporary world and the author of numerous works on such themes as the liturgy and the relation of Catholic thought to European culture, Fr. Guardini exerted considerable influence on Catholic thought during his lifetime. This influence has continued after his death in Munich on October 1, 1968: Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI, a former student of Guardini, and Pope Francis are among those who have referred to his ideas in their writings. It is expected that the cause for beatification will commence before the end of 2016. The correct access point for works by and about Fr. Guardini is:

Catholic journalist **Paul Likoudis** died on September 22, 2016. Born in Buffalo, New York, in 1954, he studied American History and European Literature at Eisenhower College, graduating in 1975. In the following years, he worked for a number of different Catholic news organizations and publications, serving as an artist and illustrator for the Catholic News Service; as assistant editor to the *Catholic Commentator* in Baton Rouge, Louisiana; as special projects editor for the Canadian *Catholic Register*; and, finally, as news editor for the lay Catholic newspaper *The Wanderer*. Mr. Likoudis covered, and commented on, current issues and controversies in the American Church as well as exploring its history. The correct access point for works by and about Paul Likoudis is:

On September 4, 2016, at a ceremony in St. Peter's Square in Vatican City, Pope Francis canonized the great missionary to the poor, **Mother Teresa of Calcutta**. Born in Skopje on August 20, 1910, to Kosovar Albanian parents and named Anjezë Gonxhe Bojaxhiu, the future Mother Teresa discerned a vocation to the religious and missionary life in her teenage years. At age 18, she joined the missionary order of the Sisters of Loreto, who soon sent her to India where she served as teacher and, later, headmistress at the order's convent school in Calcutta. Increasingly troubled by the poverty and suffering among the poor of this city, Mother Teresa felt called to live and serve among them. She founded a new community to minister to the poorest of the poor, which became, in 1950, a religious institute of the Archdiocese of Calcutta, known as the congregation of the Missionaries of Charity. Over time, the Missionaries of Charity developed into an international organization that, by 1996, had over 4,000 sisters running 517 missions in over 100 countries. An indefatigable worker in service to the poor, Mother Teresa came to be regarded throughout the world as a model of selfless charity and became a leading spokeswoman for the weak, the helpless, and the needy. Mother Teresa died in Calcutta on September 5, 1997 and is buried at the motherhouse of the Missionaries of Charity there. After her canonization, she is now styled as **Saint Teresa of Calcutta**. The correct access point for works by and about Saint Teresa of Calcutta is:
